What is the government's response to Guth's claims he can sell Australian birds? Key Points:

- 1. Australian bird breeders have raised concerns that live native Australian parrots exported to the Association for the Conservation of Threatened Parrots (ACTP) in Germany are being sold commercially.
- 2. Permits for export of Australian native wildlife are issued under the EPBC Act. Australia does not permit the export of any live native birds for commercial purposes. All exports to ACTP have been under permits issued by the Department for non-commercial exhibition purposes.
- 3. There have been four exports of captive bred parrots from Australia to ACTP since 2015 (comprising 94 individuals of eight species). The Department is currently assessing a fifth application to export a further 70 individuals, including seven new species (Attachment A). A timeline of events is at Attachment B.

- 5. ACTP holds birds from around the world. The ACTP website states that it breeds birds and contributes to ex-situ conservation to conserve endangered parrots and their habitats.
- 6. ACTP is open to the public by appointment only. They aim to have enough of each bird species to form self-sustaining populations. Exported birds or their offspring cannot be imported back to Australia due to biosecurity risks.
- 7. The number of birds requested for ACTP is unusual for a zoo. Most zoos are open to the public and only hold enough of a species to form a single display group.
- 8. There is no provision in the EPBC Act or regulations which prevents export of large numbers of parrots for exhibition.
 - a. ACTP has been assessed as meeting the legislative requirements of a non-commercial organisation to receive live native parrots for exhibition (Attachment A).
 - b. The Department has directly advised ACTP that offspring of exported specimens cannot be sold. ACTP has stated that the offspring of exported birds will not be sold.
- 9. Australian parrots are popular as pets. Some of the species exported to ACTP are rare in the pet market and would attract high sale prices.
- 10. The EPBC Act regulates the export of Australian native animals and animals listed on Appendix I and II of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES). All native Australian parrots except for budgerigars and cockatiels, are listed under CITES. Exports of live parrots may be permitted for non-commercial purposes under limited circumstances, such as exhibition, conservation breeding, or as household pets. Specimens exported for exhibition purposes cannot be primarily used for commercial purposes after they are no longer needed for exhibition. Exported birds may not be used as breeding stock for the commercial breeding and sale of offspring.

Sensitivities and Handling

- 11. Talking Birds magazine has published information recently about exports of native birds to Germany. The article seeks any information from its readers for a future report, and states that the Department is investigating allegations about bird exports.
- 12. A decision to issue the next permit is likely to be made by the delegate soon, subject to completion of the assessment. The Department will include conditions on the export permit to specify that the offspring of exported birds cannot be used commercially.

13. Communications, Innovation and Partnership Branch were consulted. Inquiries were also made with the Germany Government's CITES Scientific Authority, who confirmed the legitimacy of ACTP's operations.
