



F: Issues & Talking points – Threatened species: Australian sea lions in WA

Threatened species: Australian Sea Lions in WA

Issues and Sensitivities:

- Australian sea lion populations in the wild are declining. The Threatened Species
 Scientific Committee is currently assessing a nomination from HSI to uplist the Australian
 sea lion from Vulnerable to Endangered under the EPBC Act. The statutory date for the
 Committee to provide its advice on this assessment is 30 September 2018.
- 2. Australian sea lions are susceptible to drowning in bottom-set gillnets used to target sharks, such as in the Western Australian (WA) Temperate Shark Fisheries. While reported deaths are rare, even low mortality of adult females may lead to permanent loss of smaller breeding colonies.
- 3. The Department has been working with the WA Government to improve protection for Australian sea lions from these fisheries through an iterative process over a number of years. These fisheries were last assessed under the EPBC Act in August 2015. Ongoing approval was conditional on the WA Government implementing a negotiated network of zones to exclude gillnet fishing around sea lion breeding colonies by mid-2016.
- 4. The WA Government was unable to implement the agreed gillnet exclusion zones by mid-2016, citing unreasonable impacts on the local fishing industry. Minister Frydenberg agreed to extend the deadline to 30 June 2018, to allow the WA Government to negotiate a new network of closures that would still effectively protect Australian sea lions but with less impact on local fishing businesses. The WA Government also undertook to develop and invest in improved monitoring of Australian sea lion breeding colonies.
- The WA Government advised the Department in early March 2018 that it was finalising the new network of gillnet exclusion zones ready for implementation later in 2018. The current EPBC Act approvals for these fisheries expire in August 2018.

Talking Points

If asked about protection for Australian sea lions in Western Australia

- My Department is working closely with the WA Government on reducing the risk of Australian sea lions drowning in commercial gillnets used in WA's southern shark fisheries.
- The WA Government has advised it is currently finalising gillnet exclusion zones that will be implemented around Australian sea lion breeding colonies in WA in 2018.
- I am confident that, once implemented, these gillnet exclusion zones will prove an important measure to protect this nationally threatened species from potentially fatal interactions with fishing gear.

If asked about the Threatened Species Scientific Committee's consideration of HSI's nomination to uplist the conservation status of the Australian Sea Lion:

 The Threatened Species Scientific Committee is currently assessing the nomination to uplist the Australian sea lion from Vulnerable to Endangered under the EPBC Act. The statutory due date for the Committee to provide its advice to me on this assessment is 30 September 2018.
