Thanks for this. The advice I'm getting from the relevant agency here is the potential sensitivity links to the overarching commitment/framing around halving project approval timeframes to an average of ~21 months, which given where Narrabri is up to in the approvals process is a bit hard to influence through administrative efficiencies, better alignment early between regulators and collaboration with proponent etc. Is that the issue, as you understand it? From our perspective, the overall/average timeframe ambition sits alongside what we're collectively seeking to achieve in terms of ensuring projects already under assessment are able to reach approval and construction without unnecessary delays.

In terms of ensuring public confidence in decision-making processes, I think that can be managed effectively through ensuring the messaging is appropriately deferential to where things are at in the relevant approval process. The Narrabri proposal was referenced in the Energy Bilateral Agreement between NSW and Cth agreed earlier this year, for the potential benefits of increasing gas supply, so I'm not sure inclusion in the major projects list materially alters the public perception of the project being supported by both governments as a priority, subject of course to relevant regulatory approvals.

Please let me know if I've got the wrong end of the stick, and happy to discuss if that'd be helpful.


NSW has concerns about an imminent announcement re Narrabri Gas Project and have requested it be removed from the PM's list for the following reasons:
