





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TALKING POINTS AND BRIEF – 4 CORNERS

Complied 12 June 2019

ON THREATENED SPECIES...

Threatened species funding

Issues/background

Australia is home to a globally unique group of plants and animals – more than 80 per cent of species exist only in Australia. However, Australia has the fourth highest number of animal extinctions in the world. We have lost 91 species since European settlement and a further 1,800 plants and animals listed under the EPBC Act are at risk of extinction. Further, the State of the Environment Report 2016 reported that that status of biodiversity in Australia is generally considered poor and worsening.

In response to Australia's growing number of native plants and animals facing extinction, the Australian Government appointed a Threatened Species Commissioner in 2014, and launched a Threatened Species Strategy in 2015. Funding for threatened species has been mobilised through a range of Australian Government programs. The Threatened Species Strategy (2015 – 2020) Year Three report documents progress against Strategy targets. The report has been prepared and will be publically released following your approval.

Federal environment funding has declined by 35 per cent from \$528 million in 2013-14 to \$343 million in 2018-19, and is forecast to decline a further 6.4 per cent to \$321 million in 2022-23. Environment groups and some media outlets have been campaigning on the adequacy of environment funding for some time.

Talking points:

- The Australian Government appointed the first ever Threatened Species Commissioner in 2014 to address the growing number of plants and animals facing extinction.
- And we launched a Threatened Species Strategy in 2015, to focus our efforts and encourage all Australians to work together in protecting the unique species that call Australia home.
 - This Strategy includes explicit and measurable targets to tackle feral cats, improve recovery practices and improve the trajectories of 20 mammals, 20 birds and 30 plants by 2020.
 - The Threatened Species Commissioner works with state and territory governments, non-government organisations, and community and business groups to implement the Strategy.
- Since 2014, the Australian Government has mobilised \$425 million for more than 1300 projects supporting outcomes for threatened species.
 - This includes projects delivered under a range of programs including the National Landcare Program, 20 Million Trees, Threatened Species Recovery Fund, Green Army, and the National Environmental Science Program.

- It includes \$170 million recently committed through the Regional Land Partnerships program, under Phase 2 of the National Landcare Program, for projects that directly support threatened species and threatened ecological community recovery activities (to be rolled out between 2018-19 and 2022-23).
- In addition, through the Regional Land Partnerships program, we are investing \$47.5 million in Ramsar wetland projects and \$17.6 million in World Heritage projects, many of which will also deliver benefits for threatened species and threatened ecological communities. For example, a World Heritage project mapping weeds on Lord Howe Island will also benefit the critically endangered Little Mountain Palm.
- The new \$100 million Environment Restoration Fund announced in this year's Budget will
 provide an important boost for on-ground environmental action and threatened species
 recovery.
- Under the Threatened Species Strategy, a number of projects are demonstrating success in supporting threatened species recovery. For example:
 - The population of the <u>Norfolk Island Green Parrot</u> has more than doubled compared to its pre-2015 numbers, with increased efforts by Parks Australia to manage introduced rodents and secure nest sites.
 - Mallee Emu-wrens were successfully translocated back to South Australia after a
 devastating fire wiped out their original population. The re-establishment of this
 geographically distinct population significantly reduces the risk of extinction.
 - A new "Tracks App", funded by the Australian Government to support Indigenous rangers to digitally record and map wildlife tracks in remote regions of Australia, has led to the discovery that the Bilby distribution is wider than once thought.
- When it comes to the fight against extinction, no one can do it alone. The Strategy is also supported by the <u>Threatened Species Prospectus</u>, which is an innovative financing tool aimed at mobilising private and philanthropic sector support towards threatened species projects.
 - To date, at least 19 projects featured in the Threatened Species Prospectus have received support, to the value of more than \$7 million (both government and non-government sources).
 - Important contributions have been made a wide range of organisations, including governments, large multinational companies, non-government organisations and charitable trusts.
 - For example, the Australian Government partnered with the Tasmanian Government, WWF
 Australia, CSIRO and the Tasmanian Albatross Fund on a Prospectus project to prevent the
 decline of the Shy Albatross. This project involved airlifting artificial nests onto Bass Strait
 Albatross Island in July 2017 to help boost the breeding success of the Shy Albatross.
 Subsequent monitoring revealed the birds accepted the nests and personalised them with
 mud and vegetation.

Threatened Species recovery planning

Issues/background

The Australian Government is criticised for poor protection of threatened species and lack of funding to implement the protections that are in place. In particular, the development, implementation and monitoring of statutory planning documents prepared under the EPBC Act (e.g. Recovery Plans, Conservation Advices) which provide guidance on recovery action for listed threatened species and ecological communities.

Talking points

- 99.8% of Australia's more than 1800 nationally listed threatened species and ecological communities have a Recovery Plan or Conservation Advice (or both) in place, guiding our recovery action.
- The Department is currently preparing updated Recovery Plans and Conservation Advices for priority species, such as those identified in the Threatened Species Strategy, and other priorities such as the Koala.
- The development of these planning documents is a collaborative process that involves multiple stakeholders including all levels of government, regional natural resource management bodies, scientific institutions, recovery teams, industry, Indigenous communities and community groups.
- Implementation of these plans is also a shared responsibility.
- Recovery plans and Conservation Advices guide Australian Government investments in onground action. Organisations or individuals applying for funding to support the recovery of threatened species and ecological communities are required to demonstrate how their proposed activities align with these plans.
 - For example, the Recovery Plan for the critically endangered <u>Central Rock-rat</u> in the Northern Territory identified the need for feral cat management around core populations.
 An Australian Government-funded project has supported emergency baiting of feral cats around Central Rock-rat refuges in the West MacDonnell Ranges leading to an 80-90 per cent reduction in cat numbers and making a critical contribution to the species recovery.

Role and effectiveness of Regional Forest Agreements

Issues/Background

This work is led by the Agriculture Minister, the Hon Bridget McKenzie MP.

Regional Forest Agreements are 20 year bi-lateral agreements between the State and Australian governments signed between 1997 and 2000 and aim to achieve a balance between the productive use and conservation of Australia's Forests. Ten RFAs were signed across Tasmania, New South Wales, Western Australian and Victoria. Where a Regional Forest Agreement is in effect, forestry operations are exempt from assessment and approval under the EPBC Act (except when in a World Heritage property or Ramsar site).

The original Regional Forest Agreements for Tasmania, New South Wales and Western Australia have been extended and the five Victorian RFAs are in the process of being extended.

Environmental non-government organisations have been actively campaigning against the extension of the Regional Forest Agreements, particularly in NSW and Victoria. The key issues raised include whether the agreements provide adequate threatened species protections and if the State governments are complying with the agreement requirements.

Talking points

- Since the RFAs were first signed 20 years ago, conservation reserves have doubled from over
 5 million hectares to over 10 million hectares.
 - This equates to a protected land mass roughly 1.5 times the size of Tasmania.
- This means 50% of native forests found within RFAs are now protected within the CAR reserve system.
- Of the remaining native forest in RFA areas, less than 0.5% is harvested annually.
- RFAs protect threatened species through establishing and subsequently growing a conservation reserve system, and by requiring states to implement sustainable forest management practices outside of the reserve system.
- RFAs are an adaptive management framework. This means they are responsive to new
 information and changes in circumstances. So for example, requirements for protecting
 threatened species outside of the reserve system, also called prescriptions, can be amended as
 new information comes to light.
- Extended RFAs have strengthened compliance and assurance mechanisms. This includes enhanced reporting on status and trends of species, new audit clauses and annual meetings to monitor implementation.
- States are responsible for the day to day forestry operations in line with state forest management frameworks under RFAs.
- If the Department of the Environment and Energy is notified of a suspected breach of the RFA, the Department would support the Department of Agriculture, as the lead agency for the Commonwealth, to determine the appropriate course of action.

Leadbeater's Possum: conservation status and related issues

Issues/background

- The Critically Endangered Leadbeater's Possum is an iconic Australian species which is the subject of considerable national and international media attention and Ministerial correspondence, particularly in regards to forest management issues in Victoria. Leadbeater's Possum is endemic to Victoria and confined to a small range largely within the Victorian Central Highlands Regional Forest Agreement area. It is one of 20 mammals targeted for recovery under the Threatened Species Strategy and one of the two species identified for emergency intervention.
- In March 2017, the Department received a public nomination from the Forest Products
 Association to reassess the Critically Endangered listing status of the Leadbeater's Possum under
 the EPBC Act. The Threatened Species Scientific Committee completed its listing assessment of
 the Leadbeater's Possum in March 2019. You will be briefed on their advice shortly and will be
 required to make a decision by 9 August 2019.
- A 2017 draft recovery plan is also being revised, in partnership with the Victorian State
 Government, taking into consideration new information from the listing assessment and new
 research. It is anticipated that the Recovery Plan will be finalised in consultation with the
 Threatened Species Scientific Committee by September 2019. While the listing assessment and
 Recovery Plan are being finalised, a comprehensive 2015 Conservation Advice remains in place
 to guide conservation efforts.

Talking Points

- The protection of the iconic and critically endangered Leadbeater's possum is a priority for the Australian Government under the Threatened Species Strategy.
- In 2017, the Department received a public nomination to downgrade the Critically Endangered listing status of the Leadbeater's possum to Endangered, based on newly available survey information.
- The Threatened Species Scientific Committee is due to provide advice to me shortly on this matter.
- The draft Leadbeater's Possum Recovery Plan is also being updated and finalised in response to new information collated during the listing assessment.
- I expect that the draft recovery plan will be finalised by the Committee for my consideration later this year.
- The Victorian Government is responsible for the protection and management of threatened species and their habitat within RFA areas.
- RFAs enable forestry operations to be undertaken in accordance with state and Commonwealth statutory conservation planning documents, including recovery plans. State forest management systems adapt to new information including new species listings and updated recovery plans.

•	If the Department of the Environment and Energy is notified of a suspected breach of the RFA, the Department would support the Department of Agriculture, as the lead agency for the Commonwealth, to determine the appropriate course of action.

Strategy for Nature

Issues/background

- As a Party to the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD), Australia is required to have a national biodiversity strategy and action plan. *Australia's Biodiversity Conservation Strategy 2010-2030* is our current Strategy. This is the second iteration of the Strategy.
- The CBD will set a new global framework in China in October 2020 which is expect to again include global targets. The current Aichi Targets expire in 2020. This global process is drawing significant attention from environmental groups.

Australia's Biodiversity Strategy was reviewed in 2015-16 and all Environment Ministers endorsed the findings and recommendations of the review in November 2016 and committed to a significant revision for the next iteration of the Strategy.

• Public consultation on the draft *Australia's Strategy for Nature* was open from 19 December 2017 to 16 March 2018.

The intention was to launch the new Strategy at last year's Convention on Biological Diversity meeting and there has been public scrutiny as to why this did not occur. The delay is due to synthesising significant consultation input, developing web-based support tools and gaining support from all jurisdictions on the approach.

• Outcomes of public consultation on the draft *Australia's Strategy for Nature* are currently being considered by all governments through the Biodiversity Working Group.

Talking points

- Australia's Biodiversity Conservation Strategy 2011-2030 is currently being revised by the Biodiversity Working Group comprising the Commonwealth, all State and Territory Governments, and the Australian Local Government Association.
- The updated strategy is due to be considered by Environment Ministers at their next meeting later this year with the aim of launching by the end of the year.
- This is later than intended however all governments are working hard to ensure the revised approach addresses the findings of the reviews and the comprehensive consultation comments received.
- All governments are also working hard to ensure that the updated Strategy provides a flexible guiding framework which will be responsive to changing international commitments, such as the post 2020 global framework which will be agreed under the Convention on Biological Diversity in October next year.

National Environmental Science Program (researchers interviewed by Four Corners/7.30 Report)

- The Australian Government has a long track record of investing in environmental research to support evidence-based decision making.
- The National Environmental Science Program (NESP) is a long-term commitment by the Australian Government to environment and climate research delivered by independent experts.
- NESP funding of \$145 million over six years from 2015 to 2021 supports six research hubs, along with projects to address emerging environmental research needs.
- Hub researchers are employees of hub partner institutions and organisations, for example, universities and CSIRO. Hub research is funded by the National Environmental Science Program, with contributions from hub partners and collaborators.

Toondah Harbour and the Eastern Curlew

- The development of Toondah Harbour will be carefully assessed by the Department of the Environment and Energy under national environmental law.
- The assessment will include consideration of the potential impacts on species such as the critically endangered Eastern Curlew, marine turtles and Dugong as well as the Morton Bay Ramsar site.
- The assessment will also include a public consultation period.

If asked – why are you assessing a project that was previously considered by the Department to be clearly unacceptable

- The Department recommended that a previous 2017 proposal was 'clearly unacceptable', however in 2018 the Walker Group submitted a substantially revised proposal with a reduced development footprint.
- The Department will assess this new 2018 proposal under national environmental law.

If asked - is the proposal inconsistent with the Ramsar Convention

- Consistent with the Ramsar Convention, Australia protects internationally listed wetlands, which includes the Moreton Bay Ramsar site.
- The Department's assessment will consider likely impacts on the Ramsar site, and whether the proposal is consistent with the Ramsar Convention.

Background

- Walker Group Holdings Pty Ltd has proposed the Toondah Harbour development, south of Brisbane.
- The development includes a mixed-use residential, commercial, retail and tourism precinct, new ferry terminals and a marina.
- The proposal includes dredging, excavation and reclamation of land within the Moreton Bay Ramsar site and is being assessed due to the likely impacts on the Ramsar wetland, threatened and migratory species.
- On 23 July 2018 A delegate of the Minister for the Environment decided that Walker Groups substantially revised proposal was a controlled action and required further assessment under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999.
 - o This followed an earlier proposal which was considered 'clearly unacceptable'
- On 3 April 2019 the Department provided Walker Group with the finalised Terms of Reference for the Environmental Impact Statement.
- The Walker Group's draft Environmental Impact Statement for the Toondah Harbour development will be published for public comment before a decision is made about whether or not the proposal can go ahead under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999.

ON ENVIRONMENTAL APPROVALS

Adani - drone footage, 7.30 Report

- I'm aware of the allegations made in the ABC media and on the 7.30 Report.
- My Department has contacted the Queensland Government and Adam to request information, to determine whether the Commonwealth approval conditions are being complied with.
- Consistent with our Compliance Policy, the Department will not comment on the allegations while we are making enquiries.

Adani Carmichael Coal Mine

Protection for the Black-throated Finch

- Adani is required to have an approved management plan for all matters of national environmental significance in the project area and to provide environmental offsets for those matters where the project will have a significant impact. The Queensland Government must also approve these plans.
- The purpose of these management plans is to ensure Adani avoid and mitigate impacts to protected matters on the project site to the greatest possible extent.
- A specific management plan and environmental offset has been prepared for the Blackthroated Finch.
- In its offset site for the Black-throated Finch, Adani will progressively improve the condition of 33,000 hectares of suitable habitat for the bird.
- In December 2018, a delegate of Minister Price approved the Black-throated Finch Management Plan. At about the same time the Queensland Government commissioned a review of the plan.
- As a result of the Queensland review, Adani subsequently included more detail in the plan
 which has now been approved by the Queensland Government. Adani is required under
 Federal legislation to implement the newly revised plan.

Biodiversity Offset Strategy

- Both the Federal and Queensland Governments approved the Biodiversity Offset Strategy
 for Adani's Carmichael Mine project in 2016. The Strategy establishes how and where Adani
 will provide environmental offsets for its significant impacts.
- The Biodiversity Offset Strategy contains a description of the proposed offset areas to demonstrate their suitability for protected matters. It is published on Adani's website.
- The main offset area is on the Moray Downs West property, owned by Adani. The Moray Downs West Offset Area Management Plan is being reviewed by my Department.

Groundwater

Plan approvals

- Minister Price approved the two groundwater management plans required for Adani's Carmichael Mine project after receiving briefing from the Department.
- These plans have been thoroughly reviewed by nationally pre-eminent expert bodies (Geoscience Australia and CSIRO) to provide the Government with confidence that the project will deliver on its conditions of approval.

• Protecting precious water resources from the impacts of large coal mines is a priority of the Australian Government.

Groundwater monitoring

- Adani has addressed the CSIRO and Geoscience Australia advice on its groundwater monitoring by committing to install more monitoring bores in geological formations between the mine and the Doongmabulla springs.
- They have also increased the sensitivity of their monitoring thresholds.
- This will ensure that any unexpected impacts are detected early and allow avoidance or corrective actions to be taken.
- Adani's groundwater management and monitoring plan will ensure that groundwater drawdown at the Doongmabulla Springs does not exceed the approved 0.2 metres.
- The monitoring network, early warning thresholds and corrective measures outlined in Adani's plans will ensure the Doongmabulla Springs and protected.
- Adani is also required to undertake further research to better understand the source of the springs.
- The results of this research will be incorporated into future groundwater plan updates.

Note in relation to offsets:

 Adani is currently revising its Biodiversity Offset Strategy to include details of another offset property that it will secure to protect Brigalow Threatened Ecological Community. The Department will review the revised Biodiversity Offset Strategy. If the revision is approved, Adani will then have to secure the additional property and submit an Offset Area Management Plan for the Brigalow offset.

Compliance - How do we ensure people meet approval their conditions

- The Department's Office of Compliance monitors compliance with the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* (EPBC Act) and other legislation administered by the Department.
- Monitoring activities including audits, review of annual compliance reports, site
 inspections, expert advice, and access to digital information such as aerial imagery aim to
 ensure that projects are complying with approval conditions.
- The majority of approval holders are found to be complying with their approval conditions.
 Where non-compliance is found, the Department uses a range of enforcement options. For example, we may issue warning letters or infringement notices, seek court orders for remediation, or prosecute for breaches of the Act.

How environmental assessments work currently under federal law

(Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act – EPBC Act)

- Australia's national environmental law, the EPBC Act, promotes ecologically sustainable development and establishes a rigorous framework for protecting nationally important environmental matters, such as threatened species.
- Any proposed action likely to have a significant impact on a nationally protected matter must be referred for assessment under the EPBC Act.

- o The referral and assessment process includes opportunities for public comment.
- The Department will consider the proposal and any public submissions to see whether it needs to be assessed under national environment law.
- Cost recovery arrangements are in place for the referral of proposals and environmental assessments under the EPBC Act. This means the person who requires the services to assess their application pays for these services. This provides a more equitable sharing of the cost of protecting the environment between the community and those who obtain a private benefit from environmental assessments.
- Projects not likely to have a significant impact on matters protected under national environment law do not need to undergo a federal environmental assessment.
- In recent years we have further strengthened regulatory practice by:
 - establishing an independent Office of Compliance that focuses on the investigation of environmental crimes; and
 - Increasing the use of 'strategic assessments' which consider environmental impacts and protection measures at a landscape scale.



Green Army 'bike wash' station

The 'bike wash station' refers to an article published in The Guardian on 14 February 2018. The article questioned the validity of Australian Government claims that programs such as Green Army and 20 Million Trees were delivering threatened species outcomes. The Australian Government has since provided clarifying and detailed information to the media, and at Senate Estimates, regarding these claims. One of the projects identified in the article was 'Limiting mountain bike weed dispersal into vulnerable bushland' which was a Green Army project that focussed on delivering habitat improvement through weed control, by reducing invasive weed dispersal by mountain bikes, raising awareness of weed impacts and educating mountain bikers on methods of reducing weed spread to improve outcomes for threatened plants and animals. The project included activities which actively managed the threat of weed incursion including preventative measures such as the installation of a bike wash station and weed removal and treatment.

Role of the Threatened Species Scientific Committee and the Threatened Species Commissioner

The Threatened Species Scientific Committee has a statutory role under the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999*. It is an independent committee of eminent conservation scientists that provides the Minister for the Environment with advice on matters relating to listing, conservation and recovery of threatened species and ecological communities, and listing and abatement of key threatening processes.

The Threatened Species Commissioner is a non-statutory role established in 2014 to bring a national focus to threatened species. The Threatened Species Commissioner raises awareness and engages with the community, mobilises resources and builds partnerships for threatened species recovery and coordinates national effort. The role of the Commissioner is separate but complementary to the Threatened Species Scientific Committee. 

Re: The need for a comprehensive survey of Leadbeater's Possum habitat

The Australian Forest Products Association (AFPA) writes to request an urgent commitment from the Federal Government to fund a comprehensive survey of the Leadbeater's Possum's potential habitat to provide a more accurate and definitive database of the species' population, range and habitat.

AFPA and indeed all Victorian forest industries that depend on the comparatively small areas of regrowth forest that are available for timber production, strongly support ongoing efforts to secure the long-term survival of the Possum.

In addition, we maintain that the highly regulated and precautionary nature of our industry ensures that sustainable timber production is appropriately balanced with the protection of biodiversity values in Victoria's forests. We also believe that all decisions concerning the protection of threatened species must be informed by the best available scientific data.

In March 2017, following encouraging new evidence indicating the Possum population and range was greater than previously thought, AFPA submitted a request through the statutory process for the Threatened Species Scientific Committee (TSSC) to re-examine the Possum's critically endangered status.

Former Minister for the Environment Josh Frydenberg subsequently requested the TSSC to include the Possum on the Final Priority Assessment List for review. This provided an opportunity for new evidence on the Possum to be submitted as part of the review.

In news that should be strongly welcomed by both the scientific and broader community, this process has enabled the collection of additional evidence that indicates the Possum population and range is indeed much greater than was understood in 2015 when the TSSC recommended it be listed as 'critically endangered'.

Furthermore, the TSSC's assumptions about the role of forestry operations failed to take into consideration VicForests' significant operational changes.



New research submitted to TSSC's consultation process has broadened our scientific understanding of the Possum's habitat and range, with Vicforests scientists recording the Possum outside its previously known range and habitat. In its 2018 consultation paper for the listing review, the TSSC estimated there could be in excess of 10,000 Possum individuals.

There is more than 200,000 hectares of potential Possum habitat in the Central Highlands, more than 70 per cent of which is in formal National Park and conservation reserves, Special Protection Zones in State forest, or areas excluded from timber harvesting due to biodiversity and regulatory reasons. However, despite the recent new evidence, only 6-10 per cent of the Possum's potential habitat in the Victorian Central Highlands has been surveyed.

While the assumptions that informed the 2015 decision to list the Possum as critically endangered were based on the evidence available at the time, future deliberations should be informed by the most accurate science possible.

At the time of our nomination to the TSSC, AFPA wrote to Minister Frydenberg asking that should the nomination be included in the Finalised Priority Assessment List (FPAL), the Federal Government fund a comprehensive population study of the Possum, as the Department of Environment's Draft Recovery Plan recommended.

However, a comprehensive population study across all land tenures (State forests and conservation reserves) has still not occurred. Until such a study is completed, AFPA believes releasing a final Recovery Plan based on the limited science available could compromise conservation efforts and adversely impact Victoria's forest industries, which employ thousands of people across the state.

In summary, AFPA requests that the Federal Government commit at least \$1 million to fund the independent and comprehensive study necessary to close the significant gaps in data surrounding the management of this species.

It would be appropriate for the Victorian Government to also commit funding for this scientific work, noting that the Victorian Government has already committed \$3 million for threatened species surveys in state forests under the Forest Values Assessment Program as part of its Regional Forest Agreement (RFA) modernisation process.

A comprehensive survey will not only provide a more accurate understanding of the Possum's status, but also inform a whole-of-landscape approach to the conservation this important species. Please do not hesitate to contact my office if you require anything further.

PROTECTING VICTORIA'S THREATENED SPECIES

The Andrews Labor Government is taking urgent action to protect and save some of Victoria's most vulnerable and threatened species.

Minister for Energy, Environment and Climate Change Lily D'Ambrosio today launched Zoos Victoria's five-year Wildlife Conservation Master Plan and announced \$3 million in funding towards this important initiative.

Zoos Victoria has added six local native species to its Fighting Extinction priority list, bringing to 27 the number of species that without urgent intervention could be extinct over the next 20 years.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS

Listing decisions on nine species

- The Australian Government is committed to the conservation of Australia's threatened plants and animals.
- Effective conservation relies on using the best available science to ensure that species
 threatened with extinction are appropriately protected and those not eligible for listing
 are removed from the threatened species list.
- That scientific information is carefully considered by the Threatened Species Scientific
 Committee an independent expert advisory group appointed by the Minister.
- These nine species assessments were finalised at the meeting of the Scientific Committee in February 2019.
- In making its recommendations to the Minister, the Scientific Committee consulted with the public on the eligibility of these species for listing against the listing criteria.
- The information included in the listing and conservation advices for these species will help us to refine our recovery efforts, further align our activities with state and territory governments, and ensure we are getting maximum benefits from our collective efforts.
- By refining the threatened species list and ensuring it is based on the best available science, we can focus our resources where they are most needed.

Leadbeater's Possum is retained in Critically Endangered category

- Leadbeater's Possum, an endemic Victorian species, was uplisted in 2015 to Critically Endangered from Endangered. The uplisting was based on the historical and predicted future decline in "suitable" habitat being greater than 80 per cent. The 2009 fires in Victoria were a major contributor to that decline.
- Following extensive surveys which detected large numbers of new colonies of Leadbeater's Possum, the species was nominated and added to the 2017 finalised priority assessment list for reassessment by the Threatened Species Scientific Committee. The nomination assumed that additional locations indicated a lower level of threat to the species.
- The new colonies were detected using a new survey method and considerably increased survey effort. This new research did not provide additional insights into the population trend of the species, the key criterion against which the species was found eligible for listing as Critically Endangered. The new locations were used in assessment against other criteria
- The population trend was established using the trend in abundance of hollow bearing trees as an index of possum abundance, because the trees are critical nesting habitat

for the species. The availability of such trees is declining because of natural attrition, exacerbated by wildfire and logging. There is minimal recruitment of new hollow bearing trees within the range of Leadbeater's Possum because of the extensive wildfires in 1939, which means that most of the key trees are less than 80 years old. In the key areas, hollows typically do not form in trees until they are 150 years old.

- The Committee used the best available science in developing its advice, including an
 extensive list of scientific papers published as late as 2018, and liaison with experts in
 universities, industry and government agencies.
- More than 1200 submissions were received during the consultation on the assessment from the general public, scientific experts and key stakeholders.
- The Committee considered all submissions, in addition to convening a workshop of key experts and stakeholders in Canberra in February 2018.
- A substantial submission was received from the Forest Ecology and Silviculture group at University of Melbourne. As much of the work was unpublished, the Threatened Species Scientific Committee sought independent peer review on key components before considering both the submission and the reviews in the context of the assessment.
- Through the Common Assessment Method for threatened species, the Commonwealth
 Committee liaised closely with its Victorian equivalent, the Scientific Advisory Committee
 during the assessment. The Victorian committee reviewed the Commonwealth's
 assessment and supported the recommendation to retain the Leadbeater's possum in
 the Critically Endangered category.
 - the Common Assessment Method is an intergovernmental agreement aimed at achieving consistent listing of threatened species across Australian jurisdictions.

Why are species being removed from the list?

- By refining the threatened species list and ensuring it is based on the best available science, we can focus our efforts and resources where they are most needed.
- Myoporum turbinatum (Salt Myoporum) is proposed for deletion from the Endangered category, as the species no longer meets any of the listing criteria. The plant has been discovered at more locations and is not considered to be restricted in either range or population size, and is not declining.

Why are species being reassessed?

- Species recovery is complex, with many different drivers of decline.
- These assessments reflect the current knowledge of the species. The listing decisions
 demonstrate a commitment to maintaining the currency of the threatened species list
 and fulfilling the objectives of the Common Assessment Method.
- These listing decisions are about accessing the best and most up-to-date science to guide our on-ground action, and our partnerships.

- Conservation is everybody's business, and work is already underway, with the Australian Government, state and territory governments, community groups, natural resource management groups and scientists all coming together to mobilise more on-ground action to save species.
- A key outcome of the Common Assessment Method is the alignment of threatened species lists in each jurisdiction. This means that a species is listed in the same national threat category under the EPBC Act and in each state or territory where it occurs.
- Species that were listed by jurisdictions prior to commencement of the Memorandum –
 in October 2015 are being progressively reassessed to achieve consistency across
 threatened species lists.

Not enough money and the list keeps getting longer

- Since 2014, the Australian Government has mobilised more than \$425 million for projects supporting outcomes for threatened species. The Australian Government's support for threatened species includes projects delivered under a range of programs including the National Landcare Program, 20 Million Trees, Threatened Species Recovery Fund, Green Army, and the National Environmental Science Program.
- Most recently this includes \$170 million committed through the Regional Land
 Partnerships program between 2018/19 and 2022/23, under Phase 2 of the National
 Landcare Program, for projects that directly support threatened species and threatened
 ecological community recovery activities.
- In addition, through Regional Land Partnerships, the Australian Government is investing \$47.5 million in Ramsar projects and \$17.6 million in World Heritage projects, many of which will also deliver benefits for threatened species and threatened ecological communities
- Recovery is all about partnerships, and we are working with the business and private sector through the Threatened Species Prospectus, and with NGOs and state governments, to increase on-ground effort and resources for saving threatened species.

Is drought effecting these species?

- Whilst drought is affecting much of Australia, these species occur across a wide range and may occur in areas that are drought affected.
- Drought places pressure on the environment, including threatened species. It is
 important that we continue to recognise and protect threatened flora and fauna during
 challenging times.

A state emblem with national priority – the Leadbeater's possum

Today I am taking decisive and informed action in relation to our country's threatened plants and animals.

While there are a range of views, I have listened carefully to advice from Australia's Threatened Species Scientific Committee and those who make their living from the land, and decided that the status of Victoria's faunal emblem, the **Leadbeater's possum**, should remain as critically endangered.

This ensures the Leadbeater's possum remains a priority species for all levels of government.

While listing anything as critically endangered is not good news, I believe this decision will ensure this iconic mammal gets the attention it deserves.

I'm encouraged by the forestry industry's willingness to engage in the possum's survival – indeed they have invested heavily research of the possum to ensure they abide by the terms of their Regional Forestry Agreement.

It is this agreement that places a 200-metre barrier around all nesting trees, those with hollows, to protect the populations we know about, and provide much needed data on those that don't.

Effective conservation relies on scientific data. The possum is just one of nine species I've considered following advice from the Threatened Species Scientific Committee – Australia's independent expert advisory group on these matters.

Following this advice I have also made the following decisions in relation to eight more species:

I have included six Queensland frog species in the threatened species list, five in the Critically Endangered category:

- Elegant frog (Cophixalus concinnus),
- Rattling Nursery Frog (Cophixalus hosmeri),
- Mount Elliot Nursery Frog (Cophixalus mcdonaldi),
- Mountain-top Nursery Frog (Cophixalus monticola) and the
- Bellenden Ker Nursery Frog (Cophixalus neglectus),

and one in the Endangered category:

Tapping Nursery-frog (Cophixalus aenigma).

These listing decisions were based on an expert review of the conservation status of Australia's frogs, drawing on the best available scientific information.

I have included the White-throated Needletail (Hirundapus caudacutus) in the Vulnerable category of the list.

I have also removed the Salt Myoporum (Myoporum turbinatum) from the list, because it has been found to be more abundant than previously thought and is no longer eligible to be listed as threatened.

I have always been a strong advocate of community-led, practical action when it comes to managing our land.

This is why we've already committed more than \$170 million through Landcare to help communities manage their land, to benefit our native plants and animals, which in turn benefit the health and well-being of all Australians.

Since 2014, the Australian Government has mobilised more than \$425 million for projects supporting outcomes for threatened species.

Australia is recognised globally as "mega-diverse" - over 80% of mammals, reptiles and flowering plants exist only in Australia. But Australia's wildlife is facing an extinction crisis. Many of our famous and important animals and plants are in danger of becoming extinct.

The latest State of the Environment Report (2011) reported declines in many of our mammal species in all states, with the situation continuing to deteriorate. Overall, more than 1,700 species of animals and plants are listed by the federal government as being at risk of extinction.

> Key points

The Greens have a \$2.13 billion plan over 6 years (\$1.13 billion over 4 years) to fix our biodiversity crisis and provide real funding for nature. We will:

- Protect our unique native wildlife by investing \$130 million over 4 years in a *Threatened Species Plan* to map and protect critical habitat and to fund existing, unfunded recovery plans.
- Re-establish the Biodiversity Fund and double the previous funding with \$2 billion over 6 years to expand our protected areas, stop the loss of native wildlife, and better manage our established national parks, forests and reserves.

> Protecting our native wildlife

The Greens will chart the road to recovery for Australia's threatened species and ecosystems by strengthening protection for our threatened species across Australia's landscapes.

Remarkably, for all too many of our threatened species their critical habitats are not even properly mapped, let alone protected. And for many species we are on track to lose them before we even know they exist — so much more research is needed to understand our native species and what they need to survive. Our threatened species don't just include obscure critters — Australia's iconic species like koalas, wombats and

bilbies in Queensland and New South Wales, Leadbeater's Possums in Victoria, Swift Parrots and Tasmanian devils in Tasmania are in serious decline. Often "recovery plans" are in place, but they have no dedicated funding, and the loss of our wildlife continues.

The Greens' Threatened Species Plan will identify and protect important habitat, and increase funding for threatened species management and research. Our 4 year, \$130 million plan will:

- Provide \$30 million per year for 3 years to:
 - Fund comprehensive studies to identify and map important habitat nationally, including protected ecological communities, areas of critical habitat for threatened species and important wildlife corridors:
 - Protect that habitat through bioregional plans that guide development and establish clear no-go zones for different activities such as development and mining within each region across Australia. These bioregional plans would be developed in partnership with state and local governments where possible, and rolled out progressively with priority on high risk biodiversity
- Provide \$10 million per year over 4 years to:
 - Support the rapid listing of all species and ecological communities which belong on the threatened list;
 - Develop and fund the implementation of recovery plans and threat abatement plans for listed species and ecological communities;
 - Fund additional research required to help turn around Australia's biodiversity decline;

Our \$130 million *Threatened Species Plan* will be supplemented by additional funding from the restored and doubled \$2 billion Biodiversity Fund.

> \$2 billion Biodiversity Fund to expand and restore protected areas

Never before in history has our natural environment been threatened with such degradation from global warming, mining, logging, tree clearing and unsustainable land use. Our precious places need protection, and we must re-connect patches of critical habitat to allow our native wildlife to thrive.

The Greens will re-establish and double the Biodiversity Fund, which was axed by the Coalition, with \$2 billion in funding over 6 years and the first \$1 billion to be injected immediately.

The Biodiversity Fund will support a program to expand and better manage our World Heritage Areas, national parks, Indigenous Protected Areas and private land conservation. It will help to expand our National Reserve System by thousands of hectares every year. The Fund will focus in part on projects with a double benefit — both carbon storage and biodiversity outcomes.

Private landholders have a crucial role in protecting the last remaining sections of certain habitats like coastal rainforests or inland grassy box woodland which are nowadays found mostly on private land. As part of the Greens' plan, the Department of Environment make recommendations for options to use incentives in the tax system for private landholders to improve the health and extent of ecosystems under their stewardship, and to protect land in perpetuity. These recommendations should include mechanisms for securing ongoing funds for stewardship activities like weed control into the future.

For example, landholders of ecologically significant land who place a 'conservation covenant' over their land to protect it in perpetuity could claim a tax deduction equal to the value of any land use rights effectively given up.

The Biodiversity Fund will help to stop the devastating loss of our native wildlife by supplementing the Greens' *Threatened Species Plan*.

Tony Abbott axed the original \$946 million Biodiversity Fund in 2014 after it had already been cut by 50% by the former Labor government. Under the Greens plan, the Biodiversity Fund would be safeguarded for future generations by entrenching funding in legislation just like we did with funding for the Australian Renewable Energy Agency and the Clean Energy Finance Corporation, which the Greens pushed successfully to establish in the last Parliament.

Some examples of projects funded under the former Biodiversity Fund include: i

Bringing the forest back to the farm – in north Queensland, universities, farmers, conservationists and the local community worked together to bring back native forest to weed-affected farmland, creating more habitat for wildlife, better soil and water for farmers, and extra income from

carbon farming. **Details**: \$2.2 million, targeting 600 ha of land, helping 120 landholders.

Bio-links connect a fragmented landscape – in South West Victoria, crucial connecting corridors were created between key habitat for over 100 threatened species, including the southern brown bandicoot and yellow belly glider. **Details**: \$2.5 million, reconnecting 680 ha of key habitat.

Large-scale restoration - in Tasmania a coalition of groups worked on bringing the Midlands' dry native grassland back from the brink, restoring the mere 3% which remains. **Details:** \$2.4 million, restoring 1000 ha per year.

River Rescue - in southern Queensland, locals regenerated a 20 km stretch of the Condamine River degraded by floods and land clearing, supporting landholders and reintroducing native species. **Details:** \$348,000, restoring 200 ha of riparian land.

This commitment is in addition to the Greens' plan under our *Investing in Innovative Agriculture* initiative to boost Landcare funding by \$722 million over 4 years, thus reversing Tony Abbott and Malcolm Turnbull's harsh cuts.

> The Greens' track record on protecting wildlife

The Greens were founded on the vision of a robust and healthy environment, and that vision continues today. We are working hard to protect our native wildlife and wild places in the Parliament. The Greens have already achieved some significant victories in the Parliament. We have:

- Worked successfully to block the Abbott/Turnbull plans to hand over the 'water trigger' and other Federal environmental powers to protect native wildlife to irresponsible State, Territory and local governments. By negotiating with other parties and cross-bench Senators the Greens stood up for our national environmental laws.
- Secured the creation of the original \$946 million Biodiversity Fund under the former Labor government, funding communities to restore bushland and native habitats and reduce the impacts of weeds and feral animals.
- Introduced private members' bills to ensure federal environment powers are not handed to the States, and allow emergency listing of threatened species.
- Initiated a **Senate Inquiry into koalas** which resulted in threatened species listing for this national icon.
- Initiated a Senate inquiry into threatened species management across Australia, which highlighted the considerable concern of the community and experts alike for the plight of our native fauna and the need for strong federal leadership to protect the environment.

A state emblem with national priority – the Leadbeater's possum

Today I am taking decisive and informed action in relation to our country's threatened plants and animals. While there are a range of views, I have listened carefully to advice from Australia's Threatened Species Scientific Committee and those who make their living from the land, and decided that the status of Victoria's faunal emblem, the **Leadbeater's possum**, should remain as critically endangered.

This ensures the Leadbeater's possum remains a priority species for all levels of government.

While listing anything as critically endangered is not good news, I believe this decision will ensure this iconic mammal gets the attention it deserves.

I'm encouraged by the forestry industry's willingness to engage in the possum's survival – indeed they have invested heavily research of the possum to ensure they abide by the terms of their Regional Forestry Agreement.

It is this agreement that places a 200-metre barrier around all nesting trees, those with hollows, to protect the populations we know about, and provide much needed data on those that don't.

Effective conservation relies on scientific data. The possum is just one of nine species I've considered following advice from the Threatened Species Scientific Committee – Australia's independent expert advisory group on these matters.

Following this advice I have also made the following decisions in relation to eight more species:

I have included six Queensland frog species in the threatened species list,

five in the Critically Endangered category:

and one in the Endangered category:

These listing decisions were based on an expert review of the conservation status of Australia's frogs, drawing on the best available scientific information.

I have included the White-throated Needletail (Hirundapus caudacutus) in the Vulnerable category of the list. (Bird species)

I have also removed the Salt Myoporum (Myoporum turbinatum) from the list, because it has been found to be more abundant than previously thought and is no longer eligible to be listed as threatened. (Plant species)

I have always been a strong advocate of community-led, practical action when it comes to managing our land.

This is why we've already committed more than \$170 million through Landcare to help communities manage their land, to benefit our native plants and animals, which in turn benefit the health and well-being of all Australians.

Since 2014, the Australian Government has mobilised more than \$425 million for projects supporting outcomes for threatened species.

The Australian Government's support for threatened species includes projects delivered under a range of programs including the National Landcare Program,

20 Million Trees, Threatened Species Recovery Fund, Green Army, and the National Environmental Science Program.



• Following on from my decision to continue to list the Leadbeater's possum as critically endangered, a priority for my Department is to finalise the recovery plan for this species.

- Working with representatives from the Victorian Government and the Arthur Rylah Institute, the draft recovery plan is now being updated to take account of the recent research and monitoring data which informed the listing decision.
- Arrangements have also been made with the Threatened Species Scientific Committee to expedite the revised draft recovery plan, and I'm anticipating that a final draft Plan will be provided to me in July.
- Once the revised plan comes into force under the EPBC Act, and as the Leadbeater's
 possum is a focal species for the Threatened Species Strategy, the Australian
 Government will work with our Victorian counterparts to deliver the recovery
 actions identified in the plan.

By analysing state and federal budgets, scientists from the government-funded Threatened Species Recovery Hub research group have found Australian governments are spending a fraction of what is needed to conserve all the wildlife on the list.

- This statement is consistent with the overall message in the TSR Hub submission to the Senate Inquiry on Australia's faunal extinction crisis (submission 159) especially Attachment 8 The adequacy of funding streams for implementing threatened species recovery plans and preventing threatened fauna loss. Research hub director Professor Brendan Wintle said Australia was already "picking winners and losers". "We're currently spending about a tenth of what we need to spend," he said. "By not funding all species to the level that's required to keep them in the game, we're essentially allowing quite a lot of species to fail."

- The winners and losers language is not included in the TSR Hub's submission to the Senate Inquiry on Australia's faunal extinction crisis.
- The 'tenth' summary proportion is not as clear in the submission as it is described as "a need to increase funding for threatened species conservation in Australia by approximately one order of magnitude [i.e. 10 times] to reduce the likelihood of future extinctions."
- The submission suggests that research is required to determine the funding needed. "The exact scale of investment required in
 Australia could be refined through conducting scientifically rigorous studies of the funding required to prevent further extinctions."
 (p.15 in covering submission)
- The TSR Hub has conducted research to assist in prioritising threatened species recovery efforts, including emergency measures. For
 example, the 20 Australian birds and mammals most at risk of extinction over the next 20 years.

The Federal Government says it has invested more than \$400 million in threatened species recovery efforts, but Professor Wintle said analysis showed targeted spending by the federal and state governments totalled only about \$121 million.

- BCD have confirmed that the "more than \$400 million" figure was provided by BCD last week in response to a media enquiry: "Since 2014, the Australian Government has mobilised more than \$425 million for projects supporting outcomes for threatened species."
- The \$121 million analysis referred to by Prof Wintle is not specifically referred to in the TSR Hub's submission to the Senate inquiry (it may be able to be extracted with some additional number crunching). It is not part of approved TSR Hub research.

Professor Wintle said a third of Australia's threatened species were not being monitored. "We could be losing them and we wouldn't know," he said. "If we want it to stop, we're going to have to do a lot more than we're currently doing."

• This statement is based on TSR Hub research. The one-third figure is included in this <u>media release</u> (attributed to Dr Sarah Legge - senior hub researcher).

One potential success story is the eastern quoll, which became extinct on the mainland in the 1960s but persisted in Tasmania. The Federal Government has pledged \$1.5 million to help the species. There are also efforts to try to reintroduce it to mainland Australia. The eastern quoll is a cute, spotted, cat-sized mammal and Charles Darwin University conservation biologist John Woinarski said if it survived, it would be an example of what success could look like. "But this also exemplifies the fact that we do care much more and are much more successful with the charismatic species." he said.

• Professor John Woinarski is Deputy Director of the NESP TSR Hub. Note he is not attributed as a Hub researcher.

A threatened species expert with more than three decades of experience, Professor Woinarski saw the last living Christmas Island Forest Skink, named Gump, before it died in captivity in 2014. "Haunting," is how he describes seeing the animal, knowing its death would mark the end of an entire species.

Professor Woinarski said the skink was largely driven to extinction because of the introduction of a snake from Asia that ate native reptiles and its decline was exacerbated by years of mining on Christmas Island. "That extinction could well have been prevented if we'd done more about it," he said. "It was easy to remedy, we could have brought more of the individuals into captivity before the crash in the population occurred, we could have maintained that species. "We are a prosperous society, we are a caring society, we have a wonderful nature, we shouldn't be allowing such species to slip into extinction without us actually raising a finger to do anything about it," he said.

This submission addresses the following term of reference for the Inquiry:

(h) the adequacy of existing funding streams for implementing threatened species recovery plans and preventing threatened fauna loss in general

Key Issues

Australia has the second highest rate of species losses on the planet, yet has a low expenditure
on preventing extinctions relative to other western nations and the size of our extinction
problem, as outlined in a 2017 study published in the international scientific journal *Nature*(Waldron et al. 2017).

- Global studies (Taylor et al. 2005), and direct comparison of return on investment in threatened species in the USA (Bottrill et al. 2011), indicate a need to increase funding for threatened species conservation in Australia by approximately one order of magnitude to reduce the likelihood of future extinctions.
- Comparison with the USA demonstrates strong scientific evidence that listing under the USA Endangered Species Act leads to successful species recovery (Taylor *et al.* 2005). In contrast, the available evidence suggests that listing species under Australia's EPBC Act is not leading to species recovery (Bottrill *et al.* 2011). One of several reasons for Australia's poor performance in this area is that such listing is not accompanied by mandated and adequately-funded recovery actions (refer to ToR (a)).
- o Budget papers are unclear on exact Australian Government expenditure on threatened species conservation, but indicate that federal expenditure *relevant* to preventing extinction is in the range of \$41–400M in 2018/19 budget (Commonwealth of Australia 2018; and see Table 1). The upper bound represents estimated spending when all programs that could reasonably be considered to contribute to reduction in extinction risk are included (Supplementary Information S1 provides clarification of how estimates were derived). Most of these programs do not directly target threatened species.
- For comparison, in 2016, the USA spent \$US1.5B (AUD 2.03B) on conservation actions targeted at threatened species. The USA Endangered Species Act lists 1600 species as threatened and endangered (USFWS 2016), while Australia's EPBC Act lists 1775 species as threatened (and an additional 91 species that are extinct).
- The exact scale of investment required in Australia could be refined through conducting scientifically rigorous studies of the funding required to prevent further extinctions.
- To date, funding streams for threatened species recovery have been short-term, sporadic, and allocated according to a shifting set of priorities. However, species recovery requires long-term and consistent funding.
 - With the possible exception of birds and mammals, current listing of species under the EPBC Act does not encompass all species that merit listing because data on many less well-known species is insufficient to support listing decisions, and because established single-species listing processes are resource- and data-intensive (see our submission on TOR (j))¹ (Walsh et al. 2013). The number of animal species listed as threatened or extinct under the EPBC Act has increased from 327 in 2000 to 511 in 2018, an increase of 56% in less than 20 years. Without further investment, many more species are likely to decline rapidly and be eligible for listing in the future. Funding needed to conserve and recover Australia's threatened species is thus likely to grow substantially over coming decades.
 - Recovery plans are a critical foundation for preventing extinction. However, the effectiveness of recovery plans for conserving Australia's threatened species is compromised by a lack of funding to prepare and implement recovery actions (Bottrill et al. 2011). Standardised budget estimation for recovery planning would help increase transparency about conservation spending. Furthermore, because of changes in the EPBC Act, recovery plans are now not mandated for the recovery of Australia's threatened species. Available evidence suggests that species without recovery plans are less likely to be monitored or managed effectively (Legge et al. 2018).
 - Community interest and commitment, as well as a sound knowledge base of threats and
 of actions that can be taken effectively to control those threats, are core ingredients in
 the prevention of extinction and recovery of threatened species. However, such

¹ The recent IUCN review of all Australian squamate species indicate that the current EPBC threatened list should expand by 39% for the snakes and lizards alone (Chapple *et al. in press*). Other less well known groups, such as fresh water arthropods are likely to yield equally high numbers of species that are high candidates for listing when similar reviews are undertaken for those groups.

knowledge and interest are ineffective if there are insufficient funds to take appropriate remedial actions in a timely, resolute and enduring manner (Woinarski 2018).

- The EPBC Act names the conservation of threatened species as a Matter of National Environmental Significance, reflecting that the Australian Government has accepted a primary role in ensuring threatened species recovery.
 - O It is highly appropriate that there are other contributors beyond the Australian Government to the conservation of Australia's threatened species, notably state and territory governments, conservation NGOs, philanthropic trusts, industry and the public generally. These contributions bolster the expenditure described above. Nevertheless, the need for consistency in investment in supporting threatened species as a Matter of National Environmental Significance suggests a core role for Australian Government investment.
- There is a need for greater transparency and public availability of comprehensive information on national and Australian Government expenditure on threatened species in order to progress discussion about appropriate levels of funding for threatened species conservation in Australia. What is working well?
- There have been some areas of strength in Australian Government investment in threatened species, most notably in national leadership on feral cat management through the Australian Government's Threatened Species Strategy and the National Feral Cat Taskforce, which represents a model that could be applied more broadly to other invasive species and threat management. The National Environmental Science Program provides a nationally-leading model for outcomes-driven and engaged environmental research. It includes investments in research contributing to improving threatened species recovery across several Hubs, including \$60M over six years committed through the Australian Government and partners to support Threatened Species Recovery Hub (authors of this submission).

Conclusions

- H1. To match direct spending on threatened species conservation with other developed western economies, Australia's investment would need to increase to \$1.2-1.5B/year. Such expenditure would have a reasonable chance of averting further avoidable extinctions and of recovering those species currently listed as threatened.
- H2. Accountability for expenditure on conservation of threatened species and threatened ecological communities, and for its outcomes, would be improved by transparent budget documentation along the lines of that provided for similar purposes by the US Fish and Wildlife Service.
- H3. There is urgent need for detailed costing of conservation actions necessary to prevent any further avoidable extinctions in Australia. In the absence of such analysis investments are at risk of being ineffective.

Discussion

Spending on threatened species works




Figure 1. (A) Levels of threatened global biodiversity stewarded by each country. Color coding: white and blue showing very low and low threatened diversity; yellow, medium diversity; and the four red colors, high diversity, darker reds indicating higher values. (B) Underfunding levels - darker colors indicate worse underfunding. (Waldron *et al.* 2013)

Recent scientific studies place Australia at the bottom of global performance in terms of species conservation and conservation expenditure (Fig. 1, Waldron *et al.* 2013), second only to Indonesia in biodiversity loss (Waldron *et al.* 2017).




Figure 2. The relationship between conservation spending and biodiversity loss (Waldron *et al.* 2017). Conservation expenditure on the x-axis is represented as residual around the mean. The average expenditure sits at 0 (approximately centred on the x-axis), while larger budgets (to the right) tend to lead to lower biodiversity loss (y-axis).

There is a solution to Australia's current extinction crisis. Waldron *et al.* (2017) show a strong relationship between conservation spending and biodiversity loss (Figure 2). In short, the more you spend, the less you lose. This suggests that increased spending on threatened species in Australia has the potential to secure substantial benefits.

One western nation that is reaping success through substantial investment in threatened species recovery is the United States. Empirical evidence shows that the US has effectively averted extinction of species listed under the Endangered Species Act through appropriate investment and regulation (Taylor *et al.* 2005). From 2011-2016, the USA spent at least \$US1.5B/yr on threatened species conservation actions (USFWS 2016). This is money spent specifically on threatened species projects, and does not include land acquisition or administration costs of the major agencies. This is equivalent to \$AUD2.03B: between 5 and 45 times Australia's expenditure, depending on which bound on Australia's expenditure estimate is used (see next section). In 2016, 1600 species were listed as threatened and endangered (including about 720 fauna taxa) under the US Endangered Species Act, about 175 *fewer* than the number listed under Australia's EPBC act, indicating that US agencies are spending at least 5 times the amount being spent in Australia, and arguably considerably more, to protect around 90% of the number of threatened species (plants and animals combined).

Scientific evidence for the effectiveness of US investment is strong. Suckling *et al.* (2017) found that birds listed under the US Endangered Species Act increased in population size on average by 624% since listing, while unlisted birds declined by 24% on average, indicating it is the listing (and associated regulatory and recovery actions) that is responsible for the recovery of the listed birds in the US. By contrast, with very few exceptions, trends for EPBC Act-listed threatened species are generally downward, due in large part to a lack funding for recovery actions and regulatory controls over habitat loss (see our response to Term of Reference (a)). While listing may have prevented more precipitous declines of threatened species in Australia, without more adequate funding in recovery and regulatory actions, it has not been possible to reverse the declines that led initially to species being listed.

As a percentage of GDP, it is true that Australia spends a similar amount to the US on threatened species, since Australia has a much smaller economy than the USA (around 6% the size of the US economy). Yet Australia has a similar number of listed threatened species, and a comparable land area to the US (7.6m square kilometres compared to 9.1m in the US). In dollars per listed species, or per land area, Australia is thus a long way behind the US. Our recent extinction record demonstrates that this level of investment is insufficient.

Other parts of the world are also significantly increasing the amount of funding for protection of threatened species. The LIFE multiannual work programme for 2018-2020 was adopted by the European Commission on 12 February 2018, after representatives from EU countries unanimously declared their support for the program (EU Decision 2018/210). A new multiannual work programme details how the LIFE programme will allocate resources among areas of policy priorities in 2018-2020. It clarifies budgets by specifying what kind of projects can receive support within subprogrammes for Environment and Climate Action. In total, €1.24 billion over that period will be earmarked for work on nature conservation and environmental protection, and a further €413.25 million for climate action. The multiannual work programme for 2018-2020 will increase LIFE's budget for nature conservation and biodiversity by 10%.

What does Australia spend on threatened species recovery?

Detailed analysis of Australia's current threatened species expenditure is hampered by the lack of specific reference to threatened species spending in budget papers, and a lack of specific reporting on direct threatened species conservation expenditure. Examination of 2018/19 budget papers (Commonwealth of Australia 2018) shows that there are a number of programs that that *may* contribute to some aspects of threatened species recovery. For example, activities of the Commonwealth Environmental Water Office or the *Improving your local parks and environment* program could assist threatened species conservation, but these programs are not targeted to deliver threatened species outcomes.

A reasonable estimate of Australian Government spending relevant to threatened species appears to be in the range between \$41–400M for the 2018/19 financial year (Supplementary Information S1). The upper bound of this figure allows inclusion of a range of broadly relevant programs not specifically targeted toward threatened species. Given the number of objectives outside of threatened species conservation that those programs set out to achieve, we suggest that actual targeted expenditure will be closer to the lower bound of \$41M/year allocated to threatened species conservation programs, though this figure remains uncertain due to difficulty in disentangling budget documents and annual reports of key programs.

Several of the targeted investments of the Australian Government, while relatively modest, represent good practice for Australian Government leadership in threatened species protection and recovery. Notably, the leadership and coordinated strategy for feral cat management provided through the Threatened Species Strategy and the National Feral Cat Taskforce and championed by successive Threatened Species Commissioners provides a model that could usefully be applied to managing other invasive species threats. The National Environmental Science Program (NESP) provides a nationally-leading model for research funding, by focusing on outcomes through research designed to inform environmental management and decision-making. The Australian Government funded NESP Threatened Species Recovery Hub provides a 6 year, \$60M commitment to targeted threatened species recovery research – \$30M of which is provided by the Australian Government's Department of the Environment and Energy.

Within some states of Australia, recent increases in State funding for biodiversity conservation have occurred. For example, in NSW, the Saving Our Species program (Office of Environment and Heritage 2013) sets a clear goal for the program of maximising the number of threatened species that can be secured in the wild in NSW for 100 years. The program aligns efforts under a single banner so investment in threatened species conservation can be accounted for, and assigns threatened species to management streams so the individual requirements of each species are clearly understood. Under the SOS program, the NSW State Government committed \$100M over 5 years to actions directly benefiting threatened species.

What will it cost to save threatened species in Australia?

Unfortunately, there are no nationally applicable science-based costings of the conservation expenditure required to halt extinctions of all of Australia's threatened species. However, some scientifically-rigorous regional studies estimating funding required to preserve threatened species give an indication of what might be needed on a national scale. For example, Carwadine *et al.* (2012) found that the anticipated loss of 45 mammals, birds, and reptiles from the Kimberley region could be averted by effectively managing fire, grazing, and invasive species at a cost of approximately AU\$40 million per year. This study provides a good template for analysing the net cost of preventing extinction, that could be expanded to other areas of Australia.

A global study by McCarthy *et al.* (2012) published in the journal *Science* indicates that an increase in funding of approximately one order of magnitude would enable the preservation of all birds listed by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN). This study provides a reasonable starting point for the discussion of what increase in funding is required to save Australia's threatened species. It should be noted that, given Australia's track record in extinctions, and given the likelihood that more threatened species will come onto national lists under a Common Assessment Method (Department of the Environment and Energy, n.d.), it is expected that Australia would need to invest more in threatened species conservation than most other nations, especially those with significantly lower wealth and biodiversity values.

Threatened species recovery requires long-term and consistent funding. However, to date, funding streams for threatened species recovery have generally been short-term, sporadic, and allocated according to a shifting set of priorities (Bottrill *et al.* 2011). One way to help counter this would be to invest fully in recovery actions arising from a consistent application of recovery planning. Available evidence suggests that species with recovery plans are more likely to be monitored and managed effectively (Legge *et al.* 2018). However, at the moment, recovery plans are available for only 41% of listed taxa and are often outdated. Furthermore, where recovery plans exist, they usually do not include detailed budgets, and regularly underestimate the full investment required (Fisher 2011). The proportion of species with current recovery plans will soon be less, as previous plans lapse and are not updated, but are replaced by unfunded *Conservation Advices*. Revitalising the recovery planning process and coupling this with detailed and accurate budgets would help furnish a fuller understanding of investments necessary to achieve threatened species recovery.

Funding transparency

While most of the land and invasive species management central to threatened species conservation falls under jurisdiction of the States and lower levels of government, the Commonwealth acknowledges threatened species as Matters of National Environmental Significance. It is, therefore appropriate that the Australian Government play a central role in threatened species conservation, including investing in recovery actions. It would also be appropriate for the Australian Government to furnish a mechanism for much greater transparency and public availability of comprehensive information on national and Australian Government expenditure on threatened species. Australian Government leadership in threatened species investment would provide for much-needed national consistency and stability in funding threatened species recovery. Greater transparency would help progress discussion about appropriate levels of funding for threatened species conservation in Australia, and allow us to better understand how much value is derived from current expenditure. Such an approach could be modelled on the annual endangered and threatened species expenditure report by the US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS 2016). The emergence of national environmental

accounts provides an opportunity to improve standard reporting about expenditure on threatened species conservation across all governments in Australia (Smith *et al.* 2017).

Collateral benefits

Spending on threatened species is not a boutique issue relevant only to a small component of Australia's biodiversity. Research on threatened species provides a broad knowledge base about threats to Australia's environments more broadly. Recovery actions for threatened species typically benefit many other species and environments and help to reduce their likelihood of becoming threatened. Monitoring of threatened species helps to assess trends in the status of, and pressures on, Australia's environmental resources generally. Community involvement in threatened species recovery provides health and welfare benefits to the public, with this being particularly marked in remote Indigenous communities (Garnett *et al.* 2009). The benefits arising from the allocation of funding for threatened species are thus many and pervasive.

Supplementary information

Supplementary information S1: 2018/2019 Budget breakdown for budget lines relevant to threatened species management.

Table 1 provides a set of budget breakdowns for threatened species conservation spending that either include or exclude programs that partially include spending on threatened species recovery. It has four "streams" of funding relevance:

- i. "Direct" spending, which is funding directly aimed at improving outcomes for threatened species.
- ii. "Relevant" spending, which includes environmental spending which is not specifically designed to benefit threatened species, but is likely to have positive indirect impacts on them. This includes actions such as generic habitat restoration and sustainable land management.
- iii. "Research" spending, which is funding for environmentally-focused research that will have some direct and some indirect benefit to threatened species.
- iv. "Unknown" spending, which constitutes the remainder of funding. This is money that is either not likely to be immediately relevant to threatened species, or was unable to be allocated to a specific project. An example of the former might include the "Solar program" which aims to increase use of reusable energy sources. This will hopefully have flow on effects for climate change, which impacts threatened species, but the pathway to impact for threatened species outcomes is indirect. The latter includes parts of the budget that would benefit from clearer spending allocations.

From the table below, it is possible to ascertain that Australia spends roughly \$400M on activities that could be considered *relevant* to threatened species, and roughly \$41M on funding directly targeted at improving Australia's threatened species outcomes. Note that only administered expenses are shown because categorising *departmental expenses* into any of our four streams of funding relevance was not possible. We acknowledge that this will leave some gaps in environmental funding, as for example, the Great Barrier Reef Marine Authority is funded largely through departmental expenses, and its activities are often relevant to threatened species.

Within the Department of the Environment and Energy: Outcome 1 seeks to "Conserve, protect and sustainably manage Australia's biodiversity, ecosystems, environment and heritage through research, information management, supporting natural resource management, establishing and managing Commonwealth protected areas, and reducing and regulating the use of pollutants and hazardous substances." Outcome 2 seeks to "Reduce Australia's greenhouse gas emissions, adapt to the impacts of climate change, contribute to effective global action on climate change, and support technological innovation in clean and renewable energy, through developing and implementing a national response to climate change." Outcome 3 seeks to "Advance Australia's strategic, scientific, environmental and economic interests in the Antarctic region by protecting, administering and researching the region."

Between July 2014 & December 2017, the Green Army program constituted roughly \$134M, some of which was relevant to threatened species, according to the Threatened Species Strategy Progress Report 2016-17. However, this program is no longer active.

"By not funding all species to the level that's required to keep them in the game, we're essentially allowing quite a lot of species to fail."

One potential success story is the eastern quoll, which became extinct on the mainland in the 1960s but persisted in Tasmania. The Federal Government has pledged \$1.5 million to help the species. There are also efforts to try to reintroduce it to mainland Australia. The eastern quoll is a cute, spotted, cat-sized mammal and Charles Darwin University conservation biologist John Woinarski said if it survived, it would be an example of what success could look like. "But this also exemplifies the fact that we do care much more and are much more successful with the charismatic species," he said.

A threatened species expert with more than three decades of experience, Professor Woinarski saw the last living Christmas Island Forest Skink, named Gump, before it died in captivity in 2014. "Haunting," is how he describes seeing the animal, knowing its death would mark the end of an entire species.

Professor Woinarski said the skink was largely driven to extinction because of the introduction of a snake from Asia that ate native reptiles and its decline was exacerbated by years of mining on Christmas Island. "That extinction could well have been prevented if we'd done more about it," he said. "It was easy to remedy, we could have brought more of the individuals into captivity before the crash in the population occurred, we could have maintained that species. "We are a prosperous society, we are a caring society, we have a wonderful nature, we shouldn't be allowing such species to slip into extinction without us actually raising a finger to do anything about it," he said.





Dear Parliamentarian,

As you take your seats in a new parliament, **Humane Society International (HSI)** is pleased to provide you with our regular Parliamentary Briefing highlighting animal protection issues on the federal agenda.

Extinction Nation

A seminal <u>UN report</u> has warned that the ecosystem disintegration which follows species extinctions will threaten 'the very foundations of our economies, livelihoods, food security, health and quality of life'. A 'transformative change' is required in political will, in funding and in fortifying our environment laws. Australia needs to step up to provide strong environmental leadership, but until this happens we are asking the Senate to be on alert for attacks on "green tape". It is this so called "green tape" that is barely holding nature together and without which the extinction crisis will accelerate, as foretold on <u>Four Corners Extinction Nation</u> last Monday.

Agriculture Review of the EPBC Act

HSI welcomes many of the recommendations from the report on the interaction between the agricultural sector and the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation (EPBC) Act, which notes interactions have remained low since 2000. The report makes it clear there is a perception problem with the Act citing widespread beliefs that it is detrimental to farmer productivity in the face of little evidence of impact on the sector.

We support a number of common sense recommendations, such as increased regional outreach to help farmers understand their obligations and opportunities regarding biodiversity, and for a \$1 billion fund for a National Biodiversity Conservation Trust to support the public benefits of protecting our most threatened biodiversity, providing it is well designed. HSI is concerned with aspects of the report that may allow for greater political interference in what should be scientifically-based listing processes. Listing decisions must be made on scientific evidence alone.

Threatened habitats and species recognised

We congratulate Environment Minister Sussan Ley for acting promptly on scientific advice to <u>list three Threatened Ecological Communities</u> under the EPBC Act. As the nominator of all three threatened habitats, HSI had previously been frustrated by their listing being needlessly and excessively delayed.

There had been political pressure on some of these listings, as well as the Leaderbeater's possum, so Minister Ley's commitment to acting promptly on independent scientific advice from the Threatened Species Scientific Committee is to be commended.

Toondah Harbour / Moreton Bay Ramsar Development

HSI remains extremely concerned about the Walker Corporation's proposal to develop Toondah Harbour in Moreton Bay, which includes the 'reclamation' of 42 hectares of internationally protected wetlands. When the Ramsar Convention was signed in 1971, Australia designated the world's first Wetland of International Importance. Capitulating to any push to remove or weaken protections would be a blight on our proud legacy.

We continue to seek commitments opposing any change to the boundaries of the Moreton Bay Ramsar Wetland, or proposals to deem such a destructive development as 'wise use' of a Ramsar site to facilitate the development.

Governments to debate giraffe protection in Geneva

Governments will gather in Geneva in August for the UN Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species (CITES). Proposals to protect elephants, rhinos, giraffes, sharks, reptiles and insects from unsustainable international trade will be voted on. Japan will face pressure for failing to confiscate the endangered sei whale meat it brazenly has on sale despite a recent finding that it was caught in violation of the CITES treaty. We will be counting on strong leadership from Australia to defend

the world's endangered species.

Wildlife trafficking needs more than slap on the wrist

The penalties typically awarded to wildlife traffickers are low, fail to act as a deterrent and betray the resources that federal authorities expend bringing cases to trial. The <u>sentence</u> recently handed to former rugby league player Martin Kennedy was no exception. The penalties available under the EPBC Act are substantial and we would like to see sentencing guidelines for their greater use.

Australia still needs to act on ivory

With an elephant killed for its tusks every 15 minutes, the Joint Parliamentary Committee on Law Enforcement recommended Australia plug loopholes with a ban on domestic ivory trade in Australia. The issue has been discussed at Environment Ministers Meetings and we await nationally coordinated law reform in this area. There will be a decision at CITES in Geneva on the closing of all domestic ivory markets worldwide.

Court rules shark culling unscientific

The jury is in: killing sharks makes no difference to public safety and the scientific evidence for that is 'overwhelming'. So ruled the Administrative Appeals Tribunal in a legal action brought by HSI against shark culling in the Great Barrier Reef. The AAT <u>ordered</u> an end to the deliberate killing of sharks on 173 lethal drumlines in the World Heritage-listed Reef and required a trial of 'smart drumlines' to tag and release sharks off-shore, as well as research into non-lethal alternatives for swimmer safety. Instead of accepting the science, the Queensland Government is seeking to over-turn the AAT ruling at the Federal Court.

Stronger diplomatic pressure needed in response to Japan's whaling

NGOs and celebrities from across the globe wrote to <u>G20 leaders</u> last week calling for an intervention over Japan's latest commercial whaling operation. This week Japan has announced <u>227 whales</u> (150 Bryde's whales, 52 minke whales and 50 endangered sei whales) will be killed in this season's hunt, which started on 1 July in defiance of the global moratorium on commercial whaling.

Albatross in crisis

In May, governments and experts at the UN Agreement for Conservation of Albatrosses and Petrels (ACAP) meeting in Brazil declared an <u>albatross and petrel conservation crisis</u>, with an estimated 36,000 albatross killed each and every year in the Southern Ocean. The crisis is due to countries ignoring ACAP best practice advice to prevent albatross drowning during fishing operations. HSI is calling on the Australian Government to fully adopt ACAP best practice advice in all Commonwealth fisheries and to champion its adoption internationally. We recently welcomed moves towards ACAP best practice in Commonwealth trawl fisheries with stronger requirements for offal retention.

Resetting the national conversation on animal welfare

At the Agriculture Ministers' Forum in February 2019 ministers acknowledged problems with the current national approach to regulation of animal welfare and agreed to a collaborative process to find ways to improve Australia's regulatory system. As a result the Federal Department of Agriculture and Water Resources (DAWR) has embarked on a consultation process with stakeholders and commissioned a study from Future Eye, Australia's Shifting on Farm Animal Welfare, which found that 95% of people view farm animal welfare to be a concern and 91% want reform. HSI has set out our aspirations for a renewed focus on animal welfare

at the national level in this blog.

Live exports

Senator Mehreen Faruqi has announced she will be tabling a bill to bring live sheep and cattle exports to an end in the new parliament. HSI supports that goal because live exports go against basic principles of animal welfare and cannot be conducted humanely.

EU-AU Free Trade Agreement offers opportunities for animal protection

The EU trade negotiations with Australia present an opportunity for the parties to strengthen their commitments to protect wildlife and the welfare of animals. HSI is encouraging both parties to deliver on this opportunity as detailed in the <u>EU Australia Free Trade Agreement: Animal Welfare and Wildlife Trade Provisions.</u>

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As previously advised Four Corners are doing research for a story on threatened species. They are planning to film the episode through May. It will not be released until June. I'm writing to give you an update on this and I've got a couple of questions for you highlighted in yellow.

They have had background chats with Brendan, s. 47F(1) and many people outside of the hub. I think they have tried to engage with PAD but have had difficulty

due to care taker period. We do not know what their particular angle of investigation is but they appear to be looking at a very broad range of issues facing threatened species in Australia and utilising material from the senate inquiry. The amount Australia spends relative to other countries has come up in their chats with hub researchers and they have asked **s.** 47F(1) about LBP.

If they interview Brendan or any other hub members for the story are you happy for them to include their hub affiliation or not? Our preference is to include hub affiliations if you have no objections – this is an outstanding opportunity to demonstrate the research that is happening to tackle Australia's threatened species crisis, but if you have objections to hub affiliations being included please let me know.






