Bushfire recovery in the Greater Blue Mountains and World Heritage Area

Summary:

- The Australian Government took **unprecedented action** during and following the Black Summer bushfires, investing more than <u>\$17 million in the recovery of native wildlife and</u> their habitat in the Greater Blue Mountains and World Heritage Area.
- The funding is **supporting recovery activities** by natural resource managers, local councils, conservation groups and communities who are working together to tackle impacts on the natural landscapes and native animals of the region.

How the [species/region] was impacted by the fires:

- More than a million hectares were burnt in the Greater Blue Mountains and World Heritage Area region during the Black Summer bushfires. More than 60% of the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area was fire-affected.
- Following the Black Summer bushfires, the following matters were **identified as priorities** for recovery investment:
 - Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area and Gondwana Rainforests of Australia World Heritage Area
 - 10 Threatened Ecological Communities including Upland Basalt Eucalypt Forests of the Sydney Basin Bioregion, Temperate Highland Peat Swamps on Sandstone and Lowland Rainforests of Subtropical Australia
 - 99 animals including the Blue Mountains Water Skink, Broad-headed Snake, Brushtailed Rock-wallaby, Koala, Spotted-tail Quoll, Gang-gang Cockatoo and the Stuttering Frog
 - 101 plant species including the Wollemi Pine, Benson's Stringybark, and Paddy's River Box Eucalyptus.

What we did:

- The <u>Wildlife and Threatened Species Bushfire Recovery Expert Panel</u> was formed. The Expert Panel and the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment identified impacts and prioritised recovery actions for native species, ecological communities and other natural assets.
- Initial emergency bushfire recovery (Phase 1) funding was announced in January 2020 while the fires still burned, and on-ground action got underway immediately.
- <u>A stakeholder workshop</u> was held in September 2020 to inform the government's Phase 2 investment in the region. Workshop included discussion of strategic on-ground actions targeting the most impacted native species, ecological communities and natural assets and involved representatives from all tiers of government, wildlife organisations, and Hunter, Greater Sydney and Central Tablelands Natural Resource Management groups.
- Funding is going to **recovery actions** including surveys and monitoring, feral animal, weed and erosion control, habitat recovery, monitoring of Koala habitat, Traditional Owner-led cultural burning of country, and creation of artificial habitats.

Example 1 Hanging swamp recovery

BUSHFIRE RECOVERY – LONG-FORM STORY TEMPLATE

- A Greater Sydney Local Land Services project to treat invasive weeds and install erosion control to support recovery of the ancient, endangered hanging swamps of the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area.
- Gorse, Broom and Himalayan Honeysuckle weeds invaded the swamps while erosion from the following heavy rain threatened the swamps' survival.
- This work could effectively see the end of populations of these weed in the mountains.
- Supporting habitat recovery for threatened species including the Blue Mountains Water Skink and the Giant Dragonfly.
- Native plants in the swamps range from small clumps of Buttongrass to large shrubs such as Hakea and Grevillea.
- Images available.

Example 2. Neighbourhood crackdown on foxes

- Greater Sydney Local Land Services, Blue Mountains City Council and the Blue Mountains Conservation Society have partnered with local residents to launch a neighbourhood fox control program to reduce the impact of feral predators.
- Four hands-on workshops have been held with council field staff and residents of the bushfire-affected areas between Woodford and Mount Victoria
- Supporting native wildlife including Yellow-bellied Glider and Glossy Black Cockatoo.
- The control program workshops taught residents how to use cage traps to manage foxes and to identify tracks, scats and other signs of activity.
- Foxes alone are estimated to cost Australian producers more than \$37 million annually in livestock losses and cause more than \$227 million of damage to Australia's unique native environment and economy each year.
- Images available

Example 3 Phase 1 Hunter LLS multiple projects - feral animal and weed control to support animal and plant species, Regent Honeyeater monitoring

- Hunter LLS has completed 1.4 million ha targeting fox and wild dog in bushfire impacted areas and adjoining refugia (landholder participation)
- Targeted fox, deer and pig control has also been conducted over 16,000 ha
- A combination of aerial and ground-based programs have been used benefiting animals including Koala, Manning River Helmeted Turtle and Brush-tailed Rock-wallaby, and Littoral Rainforest and Coastal Swamp Oak Forest TECs
- Fauna surveys have been conducted across these areas using game cameras.
- Support to Wollombi Valley Landcare landholders (GBM-WHA) to treat post fire sprouting blackberry, lantana and asparagus fern initial and follow up treatments over 17 ha
- Regent Honeyeaters have been detected within unburnt habitat during a coastal search in the greater Blue Mountains area. Monitoring has confirmed that the two of the nests have led to the successful fledging of chicks.

Wildfires, deforestation and global heating turn 10 Unesco forests into carbon sources

'World heritage sites in US, Australia and Russia among those that have emitted more carbon than they absorbed since 2001'

Forests in at least 10 <u>Unesco</u> world heritage sites have become net sources of carbon since the turn of the millennium due to wildfires, deforestation and global heating, says a new report.

Protected areas such as Yosemite national park in the US, the Greater Blue Mountains area in Australia and the tropical rainforests of Sumatra in Indonesia are among the sites that have emitted more carbon than they absorbed since 2001 as a result of human activities, according to research by the World Resources Institute, the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) and Unesco. The analysis found more sites were expected to switch from sinks to sources of carbon in the coming decades.

Unesco sites still represent an enormous carbon bank – comprising a forested area twice the size of Germany, storing the carbon equivalent of Kuwait's recoverable oil reserves. But researchers said they were surprised and disturbed by the findings in the first scientific assessment of greenhouse gases the sites emitted and absorbed.

Tales Carvalho Resende, a Unesco project officer and report co-author said: "What is happening at a world heritage site level is only the tip of the iceberg. Even in what are supposed to be the best and most protected areas, they are currently under pressure from climate change.".

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From Dominica to Malaysia, extreme temperatures, land-clearing for agriculture and wildfires have driven the increase in emissions at the 10 Unesco sites, which include Río Plátano Biosphere Reserve in Honduras, Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park in Canada and Uvs Nuur Basin in Russia and Mongolia.

Analysis of changes in carbon stores in forests on another 247 sites found 166 were net sinks, with the remaining 81 nearly neutral. Overall, the sites absorbed and stored 190m tonnes of CO2 from the atmosphere each year, equivalent to roughly half of the UK's annual emissions from fossil fuels. But the analysis found human pressures on landscapes and the climate crisis were likely to continue to degrade sites, breaking up habitats, making them less resilient and biodiverse.

"One of the things that really got our attention was the impact of wildfires. Some sites flipped into sources because of one or two wildfires that were so intense they represented the annual emissions of many countries in the world," Carvalho Resende said. "It's a vicious cycle. With global warming, you have more fires. With more fires, there's more CO2. More CO2 means temperatures continue to increase."

The report authors said governments should focus on protecting nature to combat the biodiversity and climate crises – <u>echoing a recent call by leading scientists</u> – and also highlighted the importance of protecting indigenous rights to conserving forest ecosystems. At Cop26 in Glasgow, <u>world leaders</u> are expected to announce a commitment to halt and reverse deforestation.

Elena Osipova, senior monitoring officer with the IUCN's World Heritage Programme, said: "It's a disturbing message and it's really wrong that we have disturbed some sites to the point they become carbon sources. We really should strengthen the protection of these sites and highlight their importance for climate mitigation and adaptation so it doesn't happen at other sites in the future."
