On the other hand, **Australian Ambassador to Kuwait Jonathan Gilbert** stressed that the sheep shipments from his country stop annually during the summer, not only for Kuwait but for all countries in the region, in order to maintain the safety of livestock due to the weather, but they resume in the rest of the months of the year, explaining that Kuwait imports annually, before beginning of the Australian ban which starts on June 1, enough quantities for the remainder of the ban that ends on September 22 each year. He revealed in a statement to "Al- Rai" that the ban period this year will be short, as it will end on September 14, stressing that the Kuwaiti Livestock Company has imported large quantities sufficient for it during the ban period.

Melissa advised no decision had been made, but explained that the department was obliged to consider an application on the basis of exceptional circumstances and in consideration of animal welfare risks. <sup>s47F(1)</sup> autimed that there were risks to animal welfare for yourges during this time and noted that there was a

s47F(1) asked what was likely to be considered in making the decision on the exemption Melissa outlined that the Order says the delegate can take into account all relevant considerations – we think these are primarily (a) the reason for the need for exemption and (b) animal welfare

(Meeting paused and Tina left at this point)

There was some discussion about issues such as what could be considered unforeseen and the timing of voyages. <sup>\$47G(1)</sup>

Melissa and Carol noted that the science was not complete mentioned the gaps in information about duration and diurnal variation. <sup>\$47F(1)</sup> stated that 2 days for duration was a key factor. <sup>\$47G(1)</sup>



Melissa noted that the department would consider all relevant factors when making the decision, including the information it had and was in touch with the Bureau of Meteorology about predicted temperatures in June. <sup>s47F(1)</sup> asked that the department keep RSPCA <sup>s47G(1)</sup> informed about the decision. Melissa mentioned that we would need to be legally informed about who it could advise about the decision and when, however it was the department's intention to publish a statement of reasons for the decision.

# Meeting with Animals Australia (AA): 10:15

Melissa McEwen, Carol Sheridan

<sup>s47F(1)</sup> advised that AA made contact with the department due to concerns about possibility of an exemption and the ship leaving post 1 June.

<sup>s47F</sup> requested an update and asked about the likelihood of the decision. <sup>s47F</sup> mentioned that AA had a supporter base that was equally concerned, but that they would not pass on the contents of this meeting to them. Melissa clarified that if there is a risk of COVID on board, that would be taken into account when considering whether to issue an export permit, as the crew need to be able to look after the animals. Melissa explained that at the moment exporter is exploring options and has made request for exemption, but more detail needed before a decision could be made.

The department is legally obliged to consider an exemption request and make a decision -2 considerations -1. the reasons for request (not for exporter convenience) and 2. importantly, how animal welfare risks would be managed by exporter. We would also consider our own knowledge and consultation with BOM about forecasting.

<sup>s4/F(1)</sup> noted that we were not reinventing the wheel, and the department already has RIS and other analysis saying that voyages should not depart in June.

Melissa explained that this is more nuanced. The exemption is for an unusual situation and we are legally obliged to consider the specific circumstances, v the general situation. We are aware of body of knowledge and the proposed date of departure will also make a difference.

s<sup>47F</sup> said that she understood the department's obligation and that AA sent the email yesterday. (1)<sup>547F</sup> indicated that food security may be cited, and that Kuwait and Qatar have imported significant amounts of sheep meat this year. <sup>547F</sup> expressed the view that it could undermine the system if an exemption was granted and also the associated public confidence. Generally relevant also is that South Africa is also looking at stopping shipments during this period. <sup>547F(1)</sup> may know more about this matter. Also, on behalf of workers, AA is genuinely concerned for them.

Melissa: We appreciate that and are pleased workers are getting appropriate help. Also, pleased to hear about South Africa. This indicates that Australia is leading and other countries might follow. Melissa noted that some aspects are more relevant for our consideration than others. Tina is not on this call as she is likely to be the decision maker and we want to ensure her independence. We understand the gravity of this decision and I would like to assure you that animal welfare is front of mind in this process.

Understand you have to consider application but want you to consider all the work undertaken – there are more known than unknown risks at this point in time.

Interesting thank you for information.

Carol asked for clarification about the South African situation for May. Confirmed the decision would consider animal welfare and relevant matters, including being informed by the science and evidence.

<sup>s47F</sup> responded that the South African CVO issued a direction to stop shipments in May and that one vessel was caught up in that. Also, there is a bill before Rumanian parliament to stop exports during this period.

asked about the prescribed form. Melissa noted that it was not a prescribed for but in a form approved by the secretary, essentially in writing. Melissa undertook to provide information about the 'form' to AA.

Dear Melissa,

Thanks again for your time this morning. We appreciate the Department taking into relevant consideration our concerns and points raised.

To assist, we provide headline summaries of the points raised during our meeting:

- 1. Decisions about whether to grant or not grant an exemption are expected to be based on whether animal health and welfare can continue to be protected if an exemption is granted. As such, we raised the known risks, agreed findings and available science regarding the very real risk of heat stress during shipments to the Middle East from June onwards. In particular, we referred to:
  - a. The McCarthy Review;
  - b. The HSRA Technical Reference Panel;
  - c. The available and applied relevant scientific analysis, and the climatological analysis by the Bureau of Meteorology; and
  - d. The Department's 2020 RIS for Live sheep exports to, or through, the Middle East Northern Hemisphere summer - which was adopted to stop all sheep shipments from June, and which clearly documents (at page 13) that: "The temporary measures that applied in the 2019 Northern Hemisphere summer have lapsed. Currently, sheep exports to the Middle East during the Northern Hemisphere summer are regulated primarily by the Middle East Order. These conditions include allometric pen space allowances and that exporters submit a heat stress management plan for each voyage. This addresses the issue in part, but does not adequately mitigate the risk of heat stress if ambient temperatures are very hot, as they can be in the Middle East during June to mid-September (inclusive). In this circumstance, conditions can be such that additional pen space allowances do little to reduce the risk of heat stress. [emphasis added]
- 2. ABARES meat export data from Australia to the Middle east, which demonstrates a thriving trade and a willingness for these countries to accept boxed/chilled meat in lieu of live animals.

We appreciate your prompt response. And we appreciate you continuing to provide our ongoing correspondence with you to the Secretary (or his delegate), including this email, for consideration as part of this *Al Kuwait* matter.

We wish to raise three important matters - of which we seek responses where we have asked questions:

A. Secretary (or his delegate) considering advice from a qualified animal welfare scientific expert

 The exemption decision would also need to satisfy the permit approval requirement under the *Export Control (Animals) Order 2004.* Specifically, that the Secretary (or his delegate) is satisfied that the travel arrangements for the live-stock are adequate for their health and welfare. The science underpinning the *Australian Meat and Live-stock Industry (Prohibition of Export of Sheep by Sea to Middle East—Northern Summer) Order 2020* (Prohibition Order 2020) makes clear that shipments post 1 June must be prohibited. The Explanatory Statement to the Prohibition Order 2020 provides:

The Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment has consulted widely in making its policy decision. The department considered recommendations from the McCarthy Review, the HSRA review technical reference panel, public submissions to the draft RIS and policy options discussion paper. Scientific analysis was considered including climatological analysis by the Bureau of Meteorology (2019), data provided by the Australian Bureau of Agricultural and Resource Economics and Sciences (ABARES), and voyage reports from Australian Government Accredited Veterinarians (AAVs) and Independent Observers (IOs) on board vessels during 2018 and 2019 Northern Hemisphere summer months.

2. Further, the Australian Veterinary Association has released a public statement <u>linking</u> to their letter to Minister Littleproud regarding this recent *Al Kuwait* matter. They have stated that:

The paradigm has moved away from only assessing mortality, to considerations of animal welfare, and the expectation is that sheep should not suffer throughout the many weeks they are on board. Using the HSRA model, we know that sheep will be subjected to ambient wet bulb temperatures which exceed their Heat Stress Thresholds during June; and no amount of increased space or ventilation can reduce shipboard temperatures below ambient temperature.

For these reasons, and consistent with the advice we have provided previously, we believe that the welfare risks to the animals are unacceptably high in June, and that no exemptions should be granted. It is critical that the Government upholds the regulations, to ensure that animal welfare standards during live export of sheep are in line with the expectations of the veterinary profession and the wider community. [emphasis added]

- 3. Given that the leading accredited animal welfare experts in this field (<u>veterinary and scientific</u>) have strongly concluded that the increased risk of heart stress and mortality for departures after 1 June presents an unacceptably high risk to animal welfare:
  - a. Can you please confirm who the Secretary (or his delegate) is consulting from the veterinary and scientific profession in relation to the animal welfare considerations in this matter? If you

are unable at this juncture to disclose the particulars of the animal welfare expert, <u>can you</u> <u>please confirm that an accredited animal welfare scientific expert is being consulted as part of</u> <u>the decision making process in this matter?</u>

# B. Independent Observer Reports showing heat stress present even in May voyages

1. s. 22(1)(a)(ii)

. In our submission, we provided summaries of Independent Observer Reports for the May and June periods. In Appendix 2 we provided a summary of Independent Observer Reports with observations of elevated respiration and panting (heat stress) in sheep on voyages through the Persian Gulf/Red Sea from April 2018 to May 2019. The IO summaries show that elevated respiration and open-mouth panting are present even in May as the temperatures start to climb. The June shipments also demonstrate heat stress suffering. We request that the Secretary (or his delegate) consider the above submission and the documents referred to therein, which the Department has copies of

a. Can you please confirm that the Secretary (or his delegate) is considering all available Independent Observer reports relevant to the May/June period for Middle East shipments?

# C. Not "exceptional circumstances"

- As submitted in our correspondence dated 29 May 2020, the Explanatory Statement to the Prohibition Order 2020 provides that: "[i]t is anticipated that exemptions will only be granted in exceptional circumstances." We provided reasons as to why the Al Kuwait matter does not qualify as an exceptional circumstance, including that it does not demonstrate circumstances that could not have been reasonably foreseen.
- 2. We submit that any risk of loss to the exporter as a result of not taking the *Al Kuwait* consignment does not outweigh the fact that these circumstances were a known calculated risk taken by the exporter and we have provided facts and evidence to support the already thriving trade of boxed meat exports and a willingness of Middle East countries to continue accepted boxed/chilled Australian meat.

- The exporter submitted an application to the department for exemption from the June 1 export deadline under the Australian Meat and Live stock Industry (Prohibition of Export of Sheep by Sea to Middle East—Northern Summer) Order 2020, including an Animal Welfare Management Plan.
- Following consideration of all relevant matters under the legislation, including animal welfare and trade implications, the department has taken the decision not to grant an exemption to the exporter.
- The livestock that was to be exported in this consignment remain at registered premises and the department is satisfied there are no welfare concerns.
- · A detailed statement of reasons for this decision will be released later this week.



Weighing of sheep is conducted in trucks and is based on average weights, so there is a high risk that there will be sheep over the 50kg limit taken to the port for loading. These sheep will be at exceptional risk of very poor welfare due to heat stress, and raised levels of morbidity and mortality during the voyage. We ask what measures are in place to ensure that sheep over 50kg are not loaded on the vessel?

With regard to wool length, wool length is not averaged, so the presence of any sheep with wool length over 20mm would constitute a breach of the exemption. We note that Independent Observer reports have previously identified the presence of sheep with wool in excess of the required length under ASEL 2.3. Again, excess wool length will place individual sheep at exceptional risk of very poor welfare outcomes. We ask what measures are in place to check the wool length of all sheep prior to loading on the vessel?

We recognised that it is crucial that the Department has in place mechanisms to ensure compliance with these conditions, as they form conditions of the exemption and thus, if they are not met, the exemption is no longer valid.

We seek your urgent reply to our questions.

Thank you for your email.

With regard to our request for an Independent Observer, we note that the wording of the Northern Summer Order states:

(4) The Secretary may grant an exemption under paragraph (1)(a), subject to any conditions that the Secretary considers are necessary.

Thus, as delegate, in our view you are able to require the vessel to carry an Observer who is not an authorised officer, but who is there to provide independent assurance to the Australian Community about the health and welfare of the sheep on this voyage. The need for independent oversight is underscored by your comment in the Statement of Reasons that '*RETWA submitted that neither the logger data nor the AAV voyage data that it has also reviewed could be relied on, in particular because of anomalies in the data'*.

Thank you also for the information you provided with regard to the veterinary pre-consignment inspection. I note your assurance that 'all sheep were inspected by our officers and found to comply'. I would be grateful if you could let us know the number of officers involved in the inspection, the time they spent on the premises conducting the inspection, and the records of non-compliant sheep that were drafted out of the consignment as a result of that inspection.

Thank you for your email.

We have been working intensively on these issues over the weekend and today.

With respect to the use of an independent observer on the voyage, all efforts are currently being made to overcome the significant logistical and work, health and safety issues related to the deployment. Of particular concern is ensuring that an IO would be able to return to Australia. I note the RSPCA's suggestion that they can identify a veterinarian to accompany the voyage. The department cannot require a ship to carry an observer unless they are an authorised officer.

Further to your concerns about the selection of sheep, the department is well aware of the challenges of ensuring that sheep meet the conditions placed on the exemption and the legal implications of this. The team worked closely with the exporter over the weekend to ensure they understood how critical it was for non-compliant animals to be removed from the consignment before any inspection was undertaken at the registered premises. Our veterinary pre-consignment inspection occurred at the registered premises and all sheep were inspected by our officers and found to comply.

We recognised that <u>it is crucial that the Department has in place mechanisms to ensure compliance</u> with these conditions, as they form conditions of the exemption and thus, if they are not met, the exemption is no longer valid.

We seek your urgent reply to our questions.

# **URGENT: Expert Climate Report re Al Kuwait Consideration**

Thank you for continuing to provide our correspondence to the Secretary (or his delegate) for consideration as part of the *Al Kuwait* matter.

s22(1)(a)(ii), s47F(1)

s47F(1)

has provided a specific expert analysis of the current and projected climate through the relevant Persian Gulf passage for May and June. We request that the Secretary (or his delegate) consider <sup>\$47F(1)</sup> report in light of the legislated prohibition period test for heat stress risk. In particular, we refer to the Department's RIS for Live sheep exports to, or through, the Middle East – Northern Hemisphere Summer, March 2020 (at page 60):

> "Using a risk-based analysis of the best available science and evidence, the department determined that voyages to, or through, the Middle East should be avoided if the risk of heat stress (ambient WBTs exceeding 29°C WBT) was 5% or more. Based on climatological analysis, the department has determined that if 95th percentile ambient temperatures are at 29°C WBT or above (which leads to deck temperatures of 30–32°C WBT), there is an elevated risk of heat stress and adverse animal welfare outcomes. Industry research supports this view. The LiveCorp and MLA Veterinary Handbook for Cattle, Sheep and Goats (2020) defines important heat stress levels, noting that WBTs above 29°C are considered the 'danger' zone for sheep.

The prohibition periods have been based on data from the Bureau for 95<sup>th</sup> percentile ambient temperatures. Using 95<sup>th</sup> percentile ambient temperatures prevents exports when there is a 5% or greater likelihood that temperatures experienced on voyages to, through or at destinations in the Middle East, could cause heat stress in sheep." [emphasis added]

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The Secretary (or his delegate) will see that s47F(1) the relevant passage/area shows that there is a high risk that ambient WBT temperatures will exceed the 'danger' zone for sheep. The actual relevant temperatures in the last three days in May 2020 have already exceeded the threshold into the 'danger' zone for sheep.

Good morning Melissa,

Thank you confirming that the Department has deployed an Independent Observer (IO) on the Al Kuwait. We appreciate the considerable efforts of the staff of the Live Animal Export Branch to facilitate this, and thank the individual who has agreed to accompany the sheep on what is a highly controversial voyage at a very difficult time.

I understand that the Al Kuwait completed loading yesterday prior to the exemption deadline but that bad weather delayed the departure until today and the vessel remains 'at anchor' off the cost of Green Island. As we are now past the 17 June deadline does that mean that the particulars of the application from RETWA and the conditions of the exemption are no longer valid? If the exporter is required to apply with a new exemption application or extension or time, we request the opportunity to make a submission to that process. In the event that there is no opportunity to make further submissions, we request that our letter of 16 June be considered in your decision over whether to grant a further exemption or extension.

Finally, given the exceptional circumstances of this voyage, we would appreciate if you could provide clarification of the type of data and observations that the IO has been tasked with recording, and how soon after the voyage ends we should expect to see the IO report.
